MEDIAL (BIOTECHNOLOGY) ARE ALSO BEING RUN. ALL HE MENTIONED PROGRAMS ARE RUN ON THE CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM TO SUIT THE NEEDS OF STUDENTS AND TO KEEP PACE WITH THE DEVELOPMENT IN HIGHER

EDUCATION WORLDWIDE. THE CBCS PROVIDES CHOICE FOR STUDENTS TO SELECT FROM THE PRESCRIBED COURSES (CORE, ELECTIVE OR MINOW OR SOFT SKILL COURSES). THE TOTAL CREDIT POINTS SECURED BY A STUDENT IN VARIOUS COURSES REGISTERED IN A SEMESTER ARE CALCULATED ON THE BASIS OF THE NUMBER OF HOURS SPENT IN LEARNING. IN ASSESSING THE PERFORMANCE OF THE STUDENTS, THE USUAL APPROACH IS TO AWARD MARKS BASED ON THE EXAMINATIONS CONDUCTED AT VARIOUS STAGES (SEMINARS, MID-TERM, ASSIGNMENT, END-TERM, ETC.,) IN A SEMESTER.
