#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The CBCS was implemented w.e.f. session 2013-14. The college offers undergraduate courses in humanities, commerce and science stream. The professional courses BCA, BBA, and B.Sc. (Hon.) Medical (Biotechnology) are also being run. All the mentioned programs are run on the choice based credit system to suit the needs of students and to keep pace with the development in higher education worldwide. The CBCS provides choice for students to select from the prescribed courses (core, elective or minor or soft skill courses). The total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester are calculated on the basis of the number of hours spent in learning. In assessing the performance of the students, the usual approach is to award marks based on the examinations conducted at various stages (seminars, presentation, mid term, assignment, end-term, etc.,) in a semester. The total course credits taken during that semester are reflected in the SGPA score. These marks accumulated by the student are converted to letter grades based on a relative grading system and award the grades. Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) is formed by the end of August. The College Student Central Association (CSCA) is formed by nomination as per the Himachal Pradesh University Shimla guidelines. The second and fourth Saturday of every month is the day for extra co-curricular activities. The Mid Term examination for semester classes is conducted by a centralized date-sheet. The athletic meet is organized in mid of November. Effective teaching-learning methods are adopted for overall development of students.
